Since 1918, **Saraswati Mahal Library** has been a possession of the state of Tamil Nadu. It has some rare books and manuscripts(39,300) in Sanskrit and other languages. A museum is located in the library building highlighting Manuscripts, Illustrated Manuscripts, Printed copies of original drawing, Atlases, Thanjavur-style paper paintings, canvas and wooden painting etc, that represent the cultural and moral values of Thanjavur. **Khuda Baksh Oriental Library is** one of the national libraries of India, opened

in October, 1891 By Khan Bahadur. It has some notable manuscripts which carry the autograph of the Mughal Emperor and princes. **Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute** is located in Pune, Maharashtra, India, founded on July 6, 1917 to honour the life and work of Dr. Ramakrishna Gopal Bhandarkar, long regarded as the founder of Indology. It has many manuscripts, The critical edition of **Mahabharata**, that is also a big source of value education. Same as the other libraries in India promoted value education.
